Friends,

"...do not forget the trust of those who have chosen you. Care alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. By your words, and in your life, proclaim the Gospel. Love and serve Christ's people. Nourish them, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come." (Letter of Institution, in The BCP, p. 557)

This statement is extracted from the Letter of Institution that Bishop Hanley will be sending in the next week or so. What the letter signifies, and what the Celebration of New Ministry we are sharing on September 12th blesses, is the evolution of a relationship that began when I became part of this community as your Priest in Charge. Over the past two years we have gotten to know each other, learned about each other's gifts and growing edges, and as it happens in most long engagements, have fallen more and more deeply in love. (At least I'll speak for myself on that one). Then, after soliciting feedback from the congregation, your vestry elected me Rector. The bishop consented and with great joy in my heart, I accepted.

So what does this all mean? Having a rector is the normative condition of a church in the Anglican tradition. It is the state of settled or permanent ministry, meaning that there are no time limitations attached to the pastoral relationship. It is much like the academic status of receiving tenure, and it has some of the same roots. As rector, a priest cannot be removed from office for disagreeable teaching and preaching, a concept called "freedom of the pulpit." It also insulates the priest from retaliation for unpopular decisions like mucking around with coffee hours, prayer lists and the like. And it also protects the priest and the congregation from the encroaching

power of bishops. A bishop must ratify the election of a rector, but once installed, that bishop cannot remove a priest from their Cure without a finding of malfeasance or doctrinal irregularity.

In more practical terms this means that we're here for the long haul. It means that this community can put behind it a long period of instability in ordained leader-



ship. It means that we can really get to work on the work we have been given to do.

Thank you for the faith you have in this ministry, for the faith you have in this community, and the faith you have in God in Christ with the Holy Spirit. I look forward to seeing you on the 12th.

#### ACOLYTES: A GROWING MINISTRY

When my family first started coming to Resurrection in 2002, there were only four families with small children. There were a few older girls but they were more involved in the Choristers. The Sunday School Program for those eight (second grade) and under is growing and we hope to have more acolytes join our group. Training sessions are held by Fr. Brent twice a year. In the hall is a bulletin board of activities for the Children's Ministries and I will work on posting schedules and announcements to keep everyone informed. #### SOMETHING BEAUTIFUL IS COMING TO COR

On July 12, 13 and 14 Marsha Crosswhite and I had the privilege of participating in the Godly Play certification training at Trinity Episcopal in Portland. Our experience went way beyond "training"...way beyond. We are deeply grateful to Father Brent and COR for enabling us to attend.

Ten years ago, with the dedication, hard work and the vision of Holly Leonard, supported with generous gifts from the Women of Resurrection as well as beautiful hand-made wood lesson materials by Neil Morris, COR dove head first into Godly Play. For those children, families and teachers involved at that time, it was a deeply moving and life changing experience.

Yet, committing to Godly Play is huge and requires the full support and involvement of parents, congregants, and staff. Though it was not sustainable then, today, building on Holly's work and dedication, it seems we are ready to recreate a sacred place for Godly Play, and build this Children's Ministry in a lasting, sustainable, and profound way...with God's help.

What is Godly Play exactly? It is a Christian Ed-

ucation method developed by Episcopal Priest, Jerome Berryman, based on the teachings of Maria Montessori and Sofia Cavalletti. Though it is mostly used for Children's Christian education it has a broad array of contexts and has been found to be meaningful among all ages. It is built on the premise that even young children struggle with complex existential issues, have a deep spiritual life that adults may not understand, and have the ability to use religious narrative and symbol to express their own spirituality. I encourage you to do some reading on your own at godlyplayfoundation.org, and in the coming weeks we will make other print resources available. Needless to say, the potential for spiritual growth is very exciting.

In the remaining weeks of summer, we will be putting together a new Godly Play room, training our dedicated group of storytellers and doorkeepers, sending out notice for our first open house, and creating opportunities for everyone to be involved.

#### **SERVANT PARTNERS**

Over the past century hundreds of millions of rural people have migrated to the world's cities in search of a better life. Driven to the city by hunger, drought, war, and the search for work, people arrive with little to nothing and make their homes in overcrowded urban slums which often lack water or sanitation. Today over a billion people live in desperate conditions in urban slums and squatter settlements, frequently without the basic necessities of life. The United Nations estimates that by 2050, about 75% of the world's population will live in cities.

Stephanie Payne, daughter of Resurrection members Doris and Tom Payne, has chosen a career path in service to people living in urban poverty. She has joined a faith-based organization called "Servant Partners" (www.servantpartners.org) that does holistic Christian ministry in major urban slums around the world. Stephanie first became aware of the reality of urban poverty in 1993, when, as a fifth grader, she moved with her family to Nairobi, Kenya where she met individuals who lived and worked in the huge urban slum known as Kibera. Through additional international experiences, this awareness grew into a passion throughout her high school years and college years. At this point she is ready to take the step into full-time work with the urban poor.

Stephanie's immediate role within Servant Partners will be to coordinate an internship program in South Los Angeles, California. She has recently finished the internship program herself, and now looks forward to encouraging and guiding other recent college graduates who sense a similar calling.

Stephanie will be visiting Eugene from August 18 to 26. She will be available to discuss and share about urban poverty, Servant Partners, and her own path to ministry.

#### THE BREAKFAST MINISTRY

The Breakfast Ministry continues to serve approximately 250 guests each Sunday. COR and United Lutheran provide the 'workforce' to make this ministry possible on the 2nd Sunday of each month. Approximately 30 members of COR have participated in some aspect of this ministry. It includes food pick-up from food for Lane County and necessary purchases beyond what is available there on Friday, set-up of the dining area and the kitchen and all advance preparation on Saturdays, and the cooking, serving, and clean-up on Sundays. We have had folks of all ages — from age 8 to at least 70 — participate in some way.

We had the great fortune to again receive a grant from the Diocesan Poor and Homeless Commission for the amount of \$900 to support this ministry. Combined with support from members, the Outreach Commission, the Souper Bowl of Caring, the CROP Walk and other ministries of the Oregon Faith Roundtable Against Hunger (OFRAH), we are making ends meet.

The Breakfast Ministry continues to need new volunteers to keep up with our participation in meeting the needs of the hungry in Eugene in this important way. What better way to celebrate the Sabbath than to help feed the hungry and get to know some folks in the Eugene community that you might never encounter in your daily life? We are blessed to be a blessing!!
