Dear Friends,

"Shed abroad this gift throughout the world..." The season of Pentecost is the time in our liturgical calendar to notice the Holy Spirit in her work and movement in the world. This is a season to pay attention to the movement of God in the spirit, to notice where the sacred and profane intersect (or were never separate to begin with). Pentecost is a time to notice and take stock of where God in Christ with the Holy Spirit is leading us and the changes that come in following God.

FROM THE VESTRY

The temporal business of The Episcopal Church of the Resurrection is overseen by the Parish Vestry. It is made up of nine pledging members of the congregation who have been elected by the congregation to serve three year terms. Their responsibilities include assisting the Priest in spiritual matters, maintaining the Church property, handling all financial and legal responsibilities and ensuring that the Parish is staffed with appropriate personnel. Your Vestry for 2013 consists of Nick Crump (Senior Warden), John Richardson (Co-Junior Warden), Tim Rake (Co-Junior Warden), Doris Payne (Clerk), Kevin May, Kim Still, Katherine Moyer, Marsha Crosswhite and Ben Wenzel. Father Brent Was serves as our Chair. We meet on the first Thursday of every month.

In July of 2013, Father Brent's two year Priest-in-Charge period will come to an end. At this point, the Vestry, Father Brent and Bishop Michael Hanley will mutually decide whether or not Brent should continue his ministry here and become Parish Rector. This will give Father Brent tenure, allowing him to remain as long as he sees fit.

The Vestry will vote based on input from the congregation. We ask that every person who attends church at Resurrection, no matter how frequently give us feedback on Father Brent's ministry. This can be done in person, by phone or email or by letter. In order to contact a Vestry member check the rosters are posted in the Yellow Room and on the bulletin board

next to Father Brent's office. Feedback will be confidential, shared only with the Vestry minus Father Brent. June 26 is the deadline.

Finally, we encourage you to participate in our work. Please read the minutes of our meetings, posted next to Father Brent's office door, and remember everyone is invited to attend Vestry meetings. If you feel called to serve on the Vestry in future years, let us know.

THE SOCIAL GOSPEL COUNCIL

I have been around a lot of congregations, Episcopal, UCC, UU... churches with 10 – 1000 people every Sunday, rich and poor, urban, suburban, small town and rural, east coast and west coast, and I have never witnessed so much holy working and witnessing as I have here at Resurrection. From the Home Starter Kit folks, to the 2nd Sunday Breakfasts, from Thanksgiving baskets, First Place's Shelter Week, and Outreach commission grants, to the Earthkeepers, Occupy Interfaith, the Cropwalk, Eugene PRIDE, the parking lot program and the rest of it, this church is active in large and small ways across our community. It is inspiring, and very often dizzying. By the

time I figured out that no one really knows how and what we do in outreach, it was time to act: enter the Social Gospel Council.

The Social Gospel Council is a leadership group of people involved in outreach ministry here at Resurrection. Some represent specific ministries, others work in various ministries, while others are looking for their

niche. What we do is simple: we pray, we learn and we act.

We pray. We do just that. We begin the meeting with a prayer and some form of practice... reflecting on scripture, sitting in silence, reading a poem. Justice, true justice arises from right relationship with God.

We learn. We do just that, too. We are working our way through Ched Meyers' "Sabbath Economics," equipping ourselves with the tools we need to literately and intelligently build the kingdom of God right now. We ask difficult questions and push boundaries which need pushing, as Don Camara said, "When I give food to the poor they call me a saint, when I ask why they are poor, they call me a Communist."

Lastly, we act. Communications in justice work is primary. We exchange information, coordinate efforts, and share ideas. As new ideas for ministry arises, the Social Gospel Council will decide if it is something Resurrection should take on and how. As we become a more organized church (and I dare say effectual agent of God's good work), more people need to be involved in missional decision-making, and through this council, there are. And lastly, this Council oversees the Parish Outreach line in our budget.

Social Gospel Council meetings are at 6:00 on the third Thursday of each month. All are welcome.

HOME STARTER KIT PROGRAM

The Home Starter Kit program was initiated in December 1993 by Neil and Emily Morris after the death of their son who had schizophrenia. Neil and Emily, long-standing members of COR, helped found the Lane County Chapter of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill. This ministry provides basic materials for families or individuals leaving mental health treatment, shelter or homeless programs.

Beginning in 2007, the HSK program became a multi-congregational ministry. Currently, St. John's Episcopal Church/Springfield, St. Matthew's Episcopal Church/Eugene, Central Presbyterian Church/Eugene, and Spencer Creek Lutheran Church/FISH are all actively involved.

To date this year, we have distributed more than 60 kits to families and individuals, a rate somewhat higher than past years. In addition, we have begun supporting the 'Conestoga Huts' and, when it is established, Opportunity Village by providing 'Hut Starter Kits,' with contents a bit different from the typical Home Starter Kit. We anticipate providing about three Hut Kits by the end of the year.

This year, the Vestry initiated a new way to support ministries, beginning with the Home Starter Kit program: the open plate

from the Easter Vigil and Easter Morning services were dedicated to the Home Starter Kits. The total given through those services was \$1,259, a significant portion of this year's budget. Thanks to all how have contributed and helped in keeping this ministry thriving.

ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild prepares the nave and chancel (altar area) of the church for the various worship services. They meet monthly (except July and August) and are divided into teams, each of which serves one week-end per month. Twice a year, for Christmas and Holy Week/Easter, their work parties do extra polishing and deep cleaning. Other responsibilities include:

- Supply orders for candles, wine, linens, vestments, vessels
- Flower orders and arrangement for regular weekly services, as well as for weddings and funerals
- Providing fresh bread for the Eucharist

The AG welcomes new members who are willing to devote their time and talents to this essential and sacred 'invisible' ministry; doing altar work, like music, touches our whole being and brings us closer to God and to each other.

FYI: the AG Flower Fund consists of donations only; it receives no funding from the budget.

SUNDAY SCHOOL
